A New Approach to Aging in Place

This year, Ottawa Salus prepared to open Capilano, a new 54-unit supportive housing residence designed to meet the unique needs of older adults living with complex mental health, substance use health, housing, and physical health challenges.

For many older adults, aging can bring increased isolation, declining health, and barriers to accessing the supports needed to remain independent. For those who have spent a lifetime navigating mental health and substance use health challenges, those barriers can be even greater.

Capilano was created to address this gap. Designed as a supportive housing community for older adults, the residence combines affordable, purpose-built housing with integrated supports that promote wellbeing, independence, and community connection. Residents will have access to individualized supports, shared community spaces, and services tailored to their evolving needs.

More than a building, Capilano represents a new approach to helping people age in the right place—with dignity, stability, and support.

Opening Doors To Dignity Campaign

Thanks to the extraordinary generosity of our community, the Opening Doors to Dignity Campaign has transformed a bold vision into reality.

Together, our supporters helped raise more than \$5 million, surpassing our campaign goal and making this the most successful capital campaign in Salus’ history.

The generosity of our donors made it possible to build Canada’s first supportive housing community designed specifically for older adults living with complex mental health and substance use challenges. For many residents, it is the first place they have been able to truly call home after years of isolation, hospitalization and homelessness.

Every donation—large and small—helped create more than a building. Together, we created a community where individuals can age with dignity, access wrap-around supports, and experience the stability, belonging and hope that everyone deserves.

This remarkable achievement stands as a testament to what is possible when a community comes together to invest in compassionate, innovative solutions to homelessness and mental health care.

Housing, Healthcare, and Support Under One Roof

This year, Ottawa Salus celebrated the reopening of Athlone, which is now home to a transitional housing program developed in partnership with Somerset West Community Health Centre’s HART Hub initiative.

Athlone provides more than housing. Through an innovative model that combines transitional housing, healthcare, and wraparound supports, residents are connected to the services they need to improve stability, wellbeing, and quality of life. Salus staff are available on-site 24 hours a day, seven days a week, ensuring residents have access to support whenever it is needed.

The partnership reflects a growing recognition that complex challenges require integrated solutions. By bringing housing, healthcare, substance use health supports, and community services together, Athlone helps people move from homelessness toward greater stability, improved health outcomes, and long-term wellbeing.

As one of Ottawa’s dedicated HART Hub housing sites, Athlone represents a collaborative approach to addressing some of the community’s most pressing housing, health, and substance use health challenges.



“**Athlone is more than a partnership**—it is a demonstration of what is possible when housing, healthcare, substance use health services, and community supports are intentionally integrated around the needs of the people we serve.

Through the collaboration between Ottawa Salus and Somerset West Community Health Centre, we have created a model that addresses the complexity of homelessness, health, and substance use challenges in a coordinated way. As communities continue to face growing pressures, Athlone offers an example of an integrated approach that can be adapted and scaled to better meet these complex needs.”

“This is Mine”

For Nancy, the journey to supportive housing was years in the making.

Her daughter, Jessica, began experiencing serious mental health challenges as a teenager. Like many families, they found themselves navigating hospital visits, programs, appointments, and a complex system they didn’t fully understand.

“I cannot describe the level of helplessness we all felt,” Nancy shared at Soirée Salus. “How stigma can isolate families like ours, and how often the system leaves you to figure things out on your own.”

Over the years, Nancy witnessed both the challenges of mental illness and the remarkable resilience of her daughter. Through it all, she never stopped hoping for stability, belonging, and a place Jessica could truly call her own.

Then, after eight long years on a waitlist, the call finally came.

Ottawa Salus had an apartment available.

When Nancy and Jessica walked into the apartment for the first time, Jessica looked around, smiled, and said:

“This is mine.”



Finding Home

“When I lay my head on my pillow at night, I know where she is laying her head at night.”

It was a moment Nancy will never forget.

Family and friends helped furnish the apartment and celebrated with a small housewarming gathering. While many of Jessica’s peers were celebrating weddings, babies, and new homes, this was her milestone worth celebrating — a home of her own, a place where she felt safe, supported, and proud.

Since moving into supportive housing, Jessica has found stability and connection. While she continues to live with schizophrenia, she now has a home, friendships, and a community she can rely on.

For Nancy, the impact has been profound.

“When I lay my head on my pillow at night, I know where she is laying her head at night.”

“Salus gave her more than a roof. They gave her a sense of belonging and a sense of dignity and self-

worth. And they gave this worried mother peace of mind.”

Today, Nancy can look to the future with greater comfort knowing her daughter has a home, a community, and the support she needs to thrive.

Stories like Jessica’s remind us that supportive housing is about more than buildings. It is about creating opportunities for dignity, stability, belonging, and hope—for the people we serve and for the families who love them.



Looking Ahead »

Byng Drive

Advancing a new supportive housing development in partnership with The Royal, Ottawa Community Housing, Rideauwood Addiction and Family Services, the Ottawa Black Mental Health Coalition, and Ottawa Aboriginal Coalition.

Healthcare Partnerships

Working alongside healthcare partners to develop innovative housing solutions that improve patient flow, support successful transitions from hospital to community, and address growing demand for supportive housing.

Townhomes

Breaking ground this summer, the Townhomes will be located on the adjacent lot of our Capilano building and will create 20 communal-style independent living units within four townhomes. This project is funded through the partnership between the City of Ottawa and the federal government’s Build Canada Homes.

Kilborn and the Supportive Housing Network

As part of the Ottawa Supportive Housing Network, Salus is helping expand Ottawa’s supportive housing pipeline through collaborative development opportunities, including a newly announced city-lead project at Kilborn Place that will be a mix of affordable, market, and supportive housing.

From Conversation to Action

This year, Ottawa Salus co-hosted the [Health and Housing Symposium](#), bringing together leaders from housing, healthcare, community services, government, and lived experience communities to explore solutions to some of Ottawa's most pressing housing and health challenges.

The Symposium created opportunities for dialogue, knowledge sharing, and collective action, while reinforcing the importance of integrated approaches to supporting individuals with complex needs.

One of the key outcomes of the event was the launch of the Health and Housing Action Table, a collaborative initiative focused on advancing coordinated solutions and strengthening partnerships across sectors.

Together, these efforts are helping to build a more connected and responsive system of care for the people and communities we serve.





Expanding Access to French-Language Services

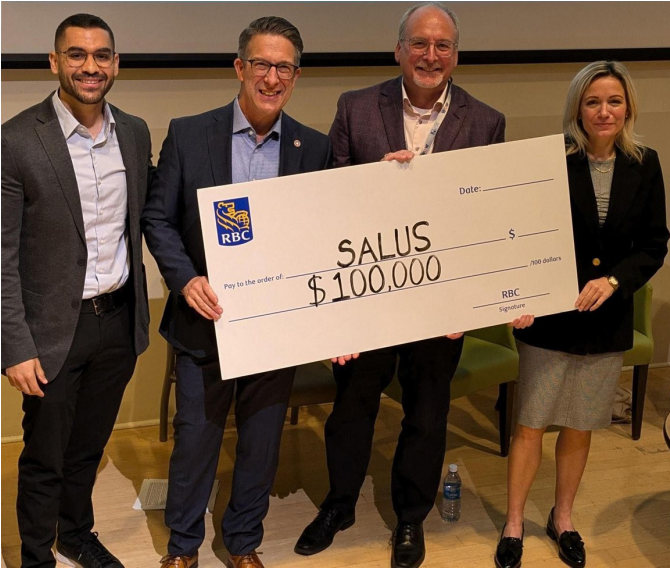
This year, Ottawa Salus partnered with Le CAP to expand access to French-language services for individuals seeking support. The partnership helps ensure Francophone clients can access services in the language of their choice while strengthening culturally responsive care and improving accessibility across the organization.

By working together, Salus and Le CAP are helping reduce barriers to service and creating more equitable pathways to support for Ottawa’s Francophone community.

Investing in Innovation

The RBC Foundation invested \$100,000 to support the development of innovative programming models that enhance the delivery of supportive housing and integrated services.

This investment will help Ottawa Salus continue exploring new approaches that respond to evolving community needs while strengthening outcomes for the people we serve.



Advancing Indigenous Partnerships

This year, Ottawa Salus continued to build relationships with Indigenous organizations and community leaders to support reconciliation and strengthen future housing and service initiatives.

By listening, learning, and working collaboratively, Salus is helping ensure that programs, services, and housing opportunities are informed by community needs and contribute to more equitable pathways to housing, support, and wellbeing.

Stronger Together

Meaningful change happens when organizations work together. Throughout the year, Ottawa Salus continued to collaborate with hospitals and healthcare providers, housing partners, funders, community agencies, and government to advance shared solutions that improve the lives of people experiencing mental health, substance use health, and housing challenges.

Growing capacity is most meaningful when it creates greater impact. This year, Ottawa Salus expanded housing opportunities, strengthened partnerships, and enhanced services to meet the evolving needs of our community. While the numbers that follow tell an important story, they represent something much greater: people finding housing, building stability, creating connections, and accessing the support they need to thrive.

NEW SERVICE

Behavioral Therapy

Ottawa Salus expanded its integrated clinical services with the introduction of behavioural therapy, increasing access to specialized mental health support for people living with complex mental health and substance use challenges.

Made possible through the generous support of the Minto Foundation, the new service included the hiring of Behavioural Therapist Patrick McKenna and a clinical partnership with The Ottawa Hospital to provide specialized training and ongoing clinical support.

EXPANDED SERVICE

Occupational Therapy

Occupational therapy services were expanded to the Athlone Program, strengthening rehabilitation supports for clients being supported by the HARThub. The service helps clients build the skills and confidence needed for daily living, supporting successful housing transitions and greater independence.

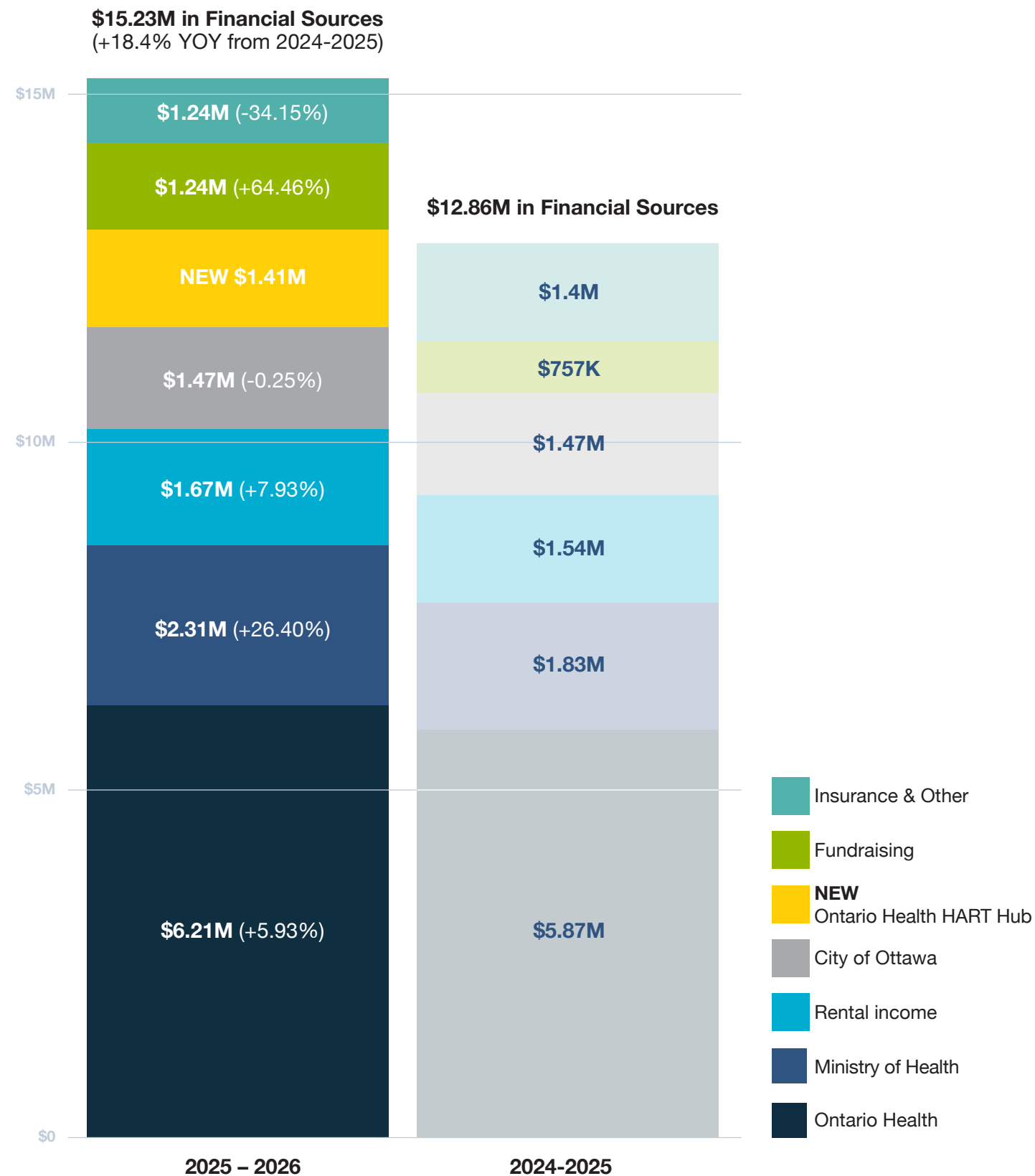
